## **HUNGER & POVERTY IN COLORADO...**

- Nearly 1 in 11 Coloradans (9.2%) struggle with hunger, not always having enough money to buy food.
  - (U.S. Department of Agriculture, <u>Household Food Security in the United States</u> in 2017, September 2018)
- More than 1 in 10 Coloradans (10.3%) struggle financially, living below the federal poverty line. This includes more than 1 in 8 kids (13%) with those under the age of 5 most likely to live in poverty.

- Nearly 1 in 7 Colorado kids (14%) may not always know when or where they will get their next meal.

- <u>1 in 30 older adults (3.2%) face hunger in Colorado</u>, forcing them to make choices between purchasing groceries or medication.

- 1 in 12 Coloradans use food stamps, including working families, children, older adults, veterans and those who are disabled.

- Of food stamp recipients in Colorado, almost 3 in 4 (70%) live with children, 1 in 4 (28%) live with an elderly or disabled resident, and almost half (42%) are members of working families.

- A Coloradan, on average, only receives \$1.39 per meal in food stamp benefits, making it a challenge to put healthy food on the table for themselves and their family.

- About <u>21,000 veterans in Colorado live in households that participated in food stamps</u> at some point during a 12-month period.

- Compared to other state participation rates, Colorado ranks <u>17<sup>th</sup> in school breakfast</u>
  <u>participation</u> for low-income students<sup>i</sup> and <u>43rd in SNAP/food stamp access</u> among low-income individuals<sup>ii</sup>.

- While Coloradan participation has improved, statewide numbers still remain low in major nutrition assistance programs. For example, only 3 in 5 low-income Coloradans (60%) participate in the food stamp program that helps struggling families and individuals purchase groceries.
